Part 3 Essay Questions	
Now that you've extensively interpreted the "Declaration of Independence" and the	
"Constitution," think about the major concepts that our Founding Fathers (the people who	
these documents) were trying to get across to people of their generation and future gener	rations.
Directions: Answer (1) of the two questions.	

1. Abraham Lincoln described the Declaration of Independence as an "apple of gold" and the Constitution as the "frame of silver" which encases it. For Lincoln, the Declaration asserts the moral and philosophical standard which the Constitution aims to implement.

QUESTION: In your analysis, to what extent does the Declaration assert a moral or philosophical vision for America? Explain the principles that constitute that vision. In your explanation, root each principle in a specific passage of the Declaration.

Moral standards are considered behaviors that can be distinguished between right and wrong behavior.

Philosophical standards are a particular set of ideas about knowledge, truth, the nature and meaning of life.

The task here is examine the Declaration of Independence and understand what Lincoln was referring to in this document as to what the moral and philosophical standards Lincoln refers to. Then give 3 specific examples from the Declaration and your explanation as to why you think that is a moral or philosophical standard contained in the Declaration by using modern examples.

2. In our beautifully written Preamble to the Constitution ("We the People of the United States, in order to form a more Perfect Union, establish justice, ensure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America."), our Founding Fathers laid out the six main goals of what our government should do.

QUESTION: What must our country do to achieve a "more perfect Union" in <u>your</u> lifetime? (Make sure what you know a "more perfect Union" means.)

- A. Answer the question by explaining your position. Give specific examples.
- B. In the second part, ask yourself what might someone say to oppose or disagree with what you said?
- C. In the last part, explain why your position is more compelling ( a better choice.)
